“Hola!”, Exit stage left, Belay, Resolutions, “behind” – *What do all these words have in common?* These words reflect the subject offerings – electives - that are part of the Years 8 and 9 Elective programmes here at Truganina College.

Electives are additional subjects distinct from the core academic subjects such as English, Humanities, Mathematics, Science, and Health and Physical Education that are offered at the College. Electives draw on the skills explicitly taught in the core curriculum and challenge our students to explore, express, apply and present and perform their learning. Integral to the elective subjects are 21st century skills such as critical and creative thinking, collaboration, and communication. In a nutshell, electives support **academic emphasis** and **stimulated learning!**

Truganina College electives and the process of elective selection allow for **Student Voice And Agency**. Students make choices for themselves based on current learning interests, career aspirations, and lifelong hobbies.

The 2024 Electives options can be categorised under the following headings: Language, Design and Technology, Sports and Recreation, The Arts and Community Engagement. New offerings based on **Student Voice** and staff opportunities include:

- Performance – Dance and Drama
- School Project/s – students develop leadership and management skills by following through with a project to make a difference to our college community.
- Outdoor Education – by exploring nature and issues around conservations students develop themselves and others.
- Model United Nations – students explore pressing global issues by simulating the workings of the United Nations.

Engaging And Empowering Our Learners!

Year 7 and 8 students were presented with the elective options for 2024 in Week 7. Families were provided with further descriptions around the subjects and information regarding voluntary contributions towards elective subjects and the process for selecting subjects via Compass.

All electives provide incursion and excursion opportunities to deepen our students' appreciation for the subject matter. We look forward to sharing the deep learning, the impact on self, others, our environment, and community through our elective programme in 2024.

School Success Starts with Attendance!

There is no safe number of days for missing school. Each day that your child misses, puts them behind, and can affect their educational outcomes.

If your child is sick or absent, you are required to notify the school as soon as possible **on the day of absence** using one of the following methods:

Log in to Compass and log the absence directly using the Parent Portal.

Telephone the school office and let the staff know your child's name, class, date of absences and reason.

Email the school and provide the staff with your child's name, class, date of absences and reason.

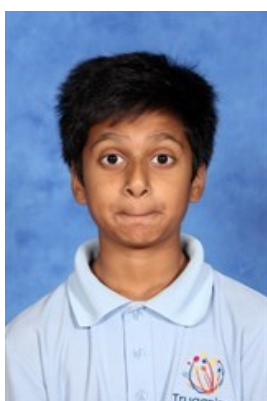

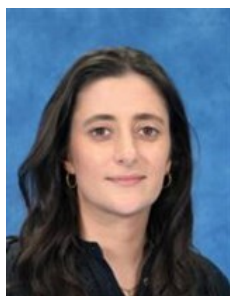

Secondary School Immunisation Program Catch-Ups

National Immunisation Program Schedule



Secondary school immunisations are provided to students to reduce their risk of contracting preventable diseases and some cancers.

Health advice regarding immunisations recommends students receive the following:

Year 7: Diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis (whooping cough) (single dose)
Human papillomavirus (HPV) (single dose)

Year 10: Meningococcal A,C,W,Y (single dose)

If your child missed out on their school-based vaccinations, please speak to your GP or local council immunisation service about how they can catch up.

To check if your child is due for any vaccines, refer to their immunisation history statement on the Australian Immunisation Register, using your MyGov account.

If your child is aged over 14, they may need to access their immunisation history statement themselves via their own MyGov account or the Medicare mobile app.

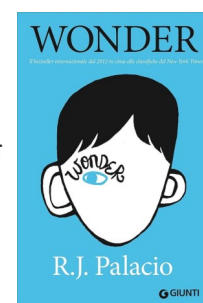
What are the staff at the library currently reading?

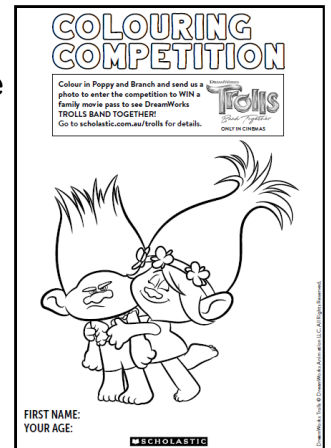

PARENT PAYMENTS POLICY

ONE PAGE OVERVIEW



FREE INSTRUCTION

- Schools provide students with free instruction and ensure students have free access to all items, activities and services that are used by the school to fulfil the requirements of the Curriculum. This includes the Victorian Curriculum F-10, the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) including the VCE Vocational Major and the Victorian Pathways Certificate.
- Schools may invite parents to make a financial contribution to support the school.



PARENT PAYMENT REQUESTS

Schools can request contributions from parents under three categories:

Curriculum Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for curriculum items and activities which the school deems necessary for students to learn the Curriculum.

Other Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for non-curriculum items and activities that relate to the school's functions and objectives.

Extra-Curricular Items and Activities

Items and activities that enhance or broaden the schooling experience of students and are above and beyond what the school provides for free to deliver the Curriculum. These are provided on a user-pays basis.

Schools may also invite parents to supply or purchase educational items to use and own (e.g. textbooks, stationery, digital devices).



FINANCIAL HELP FOR FAMILIES

- Schools put in place financial hardship arrangements to support families who cannot pay for items or activities so that their child doesn't miss out.
- Schools have a nominated parent payment contact person(s) that parents can have a confidential discussion with regarding financial hardship arrangements.



SCHOOL PROCESSES

- Schools must obtain school council approval for their parent payment arrangements and publish all requests and communications for each year level on their school website for transparency.

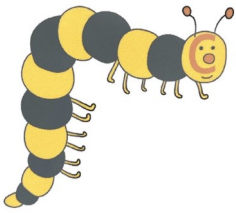

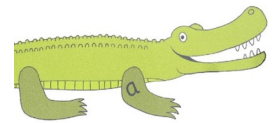
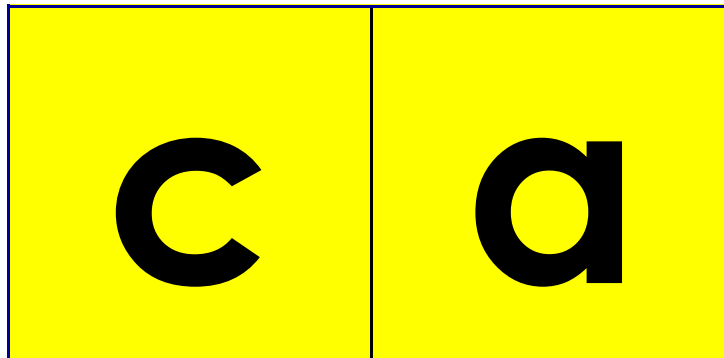
