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

Learning Experience

Learning Intention:

We are learning about the specific features of persuasive text.

I will be successful when I can:

- Understand the author's purpose and intention.
- Explain how language differs depending on the intended audience.
- Analyse how persuasive devices support the author's intended purpose.
- Display 21st century skills such as communication and creativity.

Instructions

In this Learning Task you will be required to demonstrate your understanding of the features learnt within a persuasive text:

Ethos, Logos, Pathos, Emotive Language, Repetition & Metaphor

You will be required to demonstrate your understanding of the persuasive features within a text. You will need to work collaboratively with your peers to brainstorm the persuasive features that are present in the text. You will need to explain how language can differ depending on the intended audience and analyse how each persuasive device supports the author's intended purpose. You will also need to plan, write and edit your work ensuring you use correct spelling, punctuation and grammar. This understanding will be demonstrated in the form of a poster, PowerPoint presentation or podcast.

Expectations that you will include:

- Annotated persuasive text from your group work.
- Explanation of the persuasive device.
- Description of how it persuades the audience.
- Analysis of how the persuasive device supports the author's purpose.
- Correct spelling, punctuation and grammar.

- You will be marked on:
 - Your understanding of the persuasive device.
- Explanation of the effect on the audience.
- The purpose of each persuasive feature.
- Punctuation and grammar.
- Clear communication of your
- understanding of persuasive devices.

Students at Truganina College are provided with differentiated learning experiences, utilising Google Classroom. Teachers post Learning experiences, worked examples and homework to be completed on google classroom. Teachers provide feedback to students to help them achieve next steps in their learning. We encourage all families to check in with your children to see their progress and learning on a weekly basis.

principles of the Parent Payments Policy

FREE INSTRUCTION

- Schools provide students with free instruction and ensure students have free access to all items, activities and services that are used by the school to fulfil the standard curriculum requirements in Victorian Curriculum F-10, VCE and VCAL.
- Schools may invite parents to make a financial contribution to support the school.

PARENT PAYMENT REQUESTS

Schools can request contributions from parents under three categories:

Curriculum Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for curriculum items and activities which the school deems necessary for students to learn the Curriculum.

Other Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for noncurriculum items and activities that relate to the school's functions and objectives.

Extra-Curricular Items and Activities

Items and activities that enhance or broaden the schooling experience of students and are above and beyond what the school provides for free to deliver the Curriculum. These are provided on a user-pays basis.

 Schools may also invite parents to supply or purchase educational items to use and own (e.g. textbooks, stationery, digital devices).

Parent Payment Policy

FINANCIAL HELP FOR FAMILIES

- Schools put in place financial hardship arrangements to support families who cannot
 pay for items or activities so that their child doesn't miss out.
- Schools have a nominated parent payment contact person(s) that parents can have a confidential discussion with regarding financial hardship arrangements.



SCHOOL PROCESSES

 Schools must obtain school council approval for their parent payment arrangements and publish all requests and communications for each year level on their school website for transparency.

Curriculum Contributions 2024

Our secondary School Booklists are available through our preferred online platform supplier - **Paperchase.** An online ordering procedure will be emailed to you shortly.

Orders must be placed by 20th December and packs will be delivered free of charge to your nominated address in December and January.

Our Curriculum Contributions for 2024 are \$300.00 for the year.

This covers items such as Stationery packs (delivered home), Student Planner, Student ID Cards, printing and photocopying of worksheets and learning materials, ICT configuration, maintenance and online subscriptions along with the stationery pack.

In years 8 & 9 there is a **Curriculum Contribution for Electives - \$50.00 per student per elective**. These Electives are Food Tech and Sport and Rec.

Excursions and camps need to be consented and paid by families prior to the event, this needs to be done via Compass. CSEF can be used for such events.

If you have a health care card, please contact the office on 9368 9800 to apply for CSEF funding for your children.

If you experience financial difficulties, we offer payment plans and centrepay.

Respectful Relationships & SWPBS

Respectful Relationships and SWPBS is an initiative to support school settings promote and model **respect**, **equality and resilience**. Everyone involved in our school community deserves to be respected, valued and treated equally.

We know that changes in attitudes and behaviours can be achieved when positive reinforcement is promoted across the school community, and when expectations are modelled within classroom learning.

Respectful Relationships and SWPBS is taught across the College within all classrooms. F-6 teachers are responsible for the delivery of the curriculum within social circles that occur after recess and lunch.

The Year 7-9 Health and Physical Education teachers are explicitly teaching the curriculum in the allocated hour that we have been given each week! We use this hour to provide both RR and SWPBS learning experiences.


Community Engagement

At Truganina College we value and encourage parents to take an active role in supporting their child's learning.

Parents can do this by:

- Developing good study routines.
- Ensuring regular school attendance.
- Use the student planner as a communication tool.
- Using Google classroom and Compass to access online student learning, reporting absences, information as well as important notes and letters.



Homework and Study



- + Weekly homework is given, however individual subject teachers will also set homework.
- + Support is provided for students who need assistance with any work.
- + Homework will always reinforce the learning that has taken place in the classroom.
- + As part of the homework, students should be reading every night and completing 1000 Mathletics points weekly.
- + By Year 7 students should be able to independently read for a sustained period of 1 hour. These skills are essential leading into upper secondary college.
- + Homework is different from study. Middle Years must develop the stamina to study for at least 30 minutes to 2 hours from Years 5 -9 every night.




